This record also involves a singing bird, this time during the summer. Per the observer's comments, Sibley suggests the western 'race' of Blue-headed has a more burry song, and the possibility of a western Blue-headed probably can't be completely ruled out.

The out of season summer date makes me personally wonder if it could have been an extremely worn or off-plumage Yellow-throated Vireo. There is just a little too much doubt here for me. Again, I can't help but feel the need to exercise extreme caution with such a rare and difficult to identify species. I vote to reject, and least for this circulation.

Comments:

An intriguing report. The July date makes an extralimital western bird more unusual than during migratory periods. Blue-headed Vireo is rare to stray south during summer but has precedent. Overall, the plumage details do not definitively eliminate Blue-headed from consideration. The identification is supported best by the vocalizations. In eliminating Blue-headed from consideration, the observer states, "The song quality plus the field marks described above eliminates Blue-headed Vireo." Which field marks? Everything description in section 6 of the documentation is consistent with that species in general nature. Perhaps because of the vocalizations, Cassin's would be a better fit, but because of its rarity, especially during July, I feel the possibility of an oddly singing Blue-headed hasn't been adequately eliminated. Single observer records without physical evidence are tough.
