The relatively-short, pointed (rather than rounded) central tail feathers on the bird on the right in the 1<sup>st</sup> photo and on the bird in the 2<sup>nd</sup> photo are consistent with juvenile PAJA. So, I am voting to accept the record for at least these 2 birds.

I can't tell if the bird on the left in the 1<sup>st</sup> photo is carrying something in its feet that is trailing behind the tail, or if the projection is part of the tail.

The bird in the 3<sup>rd</sup> photo appears to have a slender-enough bill to be a PAJA. Beyond that, I can't tell much more.

Sum total = 2 juvenile Parasitic Jaegers, (the jaeger sp. in Photo #2 may be the same individual as the dark juv. PAJA in Photo #3).

I vote to accept two juvenile Parasitic Jaegers (not six).
