To me, the main issue with this record is the blurriness and lack of clarity in the photos provided. I voted to reject during the 1st circulation but changed my vote to accept during the second pass for reasons previously stated.

During the previous circulation, Davida Kalina commented: "The written submission rules out a male MALL x MODU hybrid on the basis of lack of a curled center tail feather. But a female hybrid cannot be ruled out, since the submitter never observed the entire speculum." I have thought a lot about this comment, but my assumption has always been that 2013-065 is a male, based on the bright yellow bill. All of the sources I have checked indicate that bill color of both female Mottled Duck and Mallard ranges from olive-drab to orange, to black & orange, but never bright yellow as in males. To me, the bill color in Photo #2 looks bright yellow, not orange. Getting back to the poor quality of the photos, it is at least possible the bill color has been misrepresented, but my best guess is that the bill is really yellow.

In the end, I would echo Doug Stotz's comments from the previous circulation: "I think the new photo along with Bohlen's additional discussion convinces me that this bird is truly a Mottled Duck and not a hybrid. It may be that hybrids are common enough that we'll never be sure about any Mottled Duck. This record seems like about as good as we can reasonably expect."

Again, I vote to accept.
