The submitter's written descriptions of size, plumage coloration (including white eyering and white outer rectrices), shapes of tail and bill, posture, and foraging behavior are all consistent with Blue-gray Gnatcatcher and together adequately rule out similar species (except perhaps Black-capped Gnatcatcher with its more-graduated rectrices, but which occurs in far-southern AZ and would be highly unlikely anywhere else in the US). Although the sighting might be considered somewhat early for Massac County and other areas in far southern IL, Keith McMullen reported 42 BGGN even earlier in the season the year before on 30 April 2018 at Fort Massac Park in Massac County, less than 20 miles SE of Mermet Lake. I vote to accept the record.
