Large warbler. Grayish blue head and face with some black streaking in crown, white arcs above and below dark eye, black area between eye and bill; dark bill; grayish blue colored upperparts with streaking on back; weak, white wingbars; yellow chin, throat, breast, and belly, mostly unstreaked but with a couple of flecks of streaking; white at sides of breast and along flanks with moderate black streaking; dark legs.

Seen foraging in small trees. Actively pumping its tail.

This bird was initially found earlier in the day by Carl Giometti.

Hopping within foliage of small trees (about 8 to 10 feet tall), making short sallies of less than 6 inches from the branch. Repeated up-and-down pumping of the tail. Tail pumping action very noticeable but not as pronounced as that of Palm Warbler (many of which were in the vicinity)

None heard for sure.

I have seen one male and one female/immature Kirtland's previously in Chicago, and several (four to eight) individuals on the breeding grounds in northern Michigan.

12. Please eliminate other similar species and/or hybrids (use additional paper, if necessary):

Face pattern, upperparts color and pattern, underparts color and pattern are unique to the species. Among warblers with entirely or partially grayish blue or blue upperparts, Northern Parula has eye arcs but is much smaller and unstreaked below, Magnolia Warbler is much more boldly streaked below and has greenish back with male having bold black in face, Yellow-rumped Warbler has white chin and throat (Myrtle) and lacks all yellow underparts, and Grace's and Yellow-throated Warblers have different face patterns that include an eyebrow stripe.
