



I think you may have misunderstood what I was trying say. I'm not suggesting the Barnacle Goose is one that was set free. I was just saying how captive species can get loose. I also wanted to mention that Raccoons are notorious for causing damage to enclosures in their attempts to get an easy meal.

All indications is that this is a wild bird. Until or unless proven otherwise, I personally would consider this bird to be wild. I can tell you that Barnacle Geese are not very common in aviculture (at least the last time I dealt with breeders). This would be another arguement for it being wild.

I stumbled upon what appears to be the same Barnacle Goose at a quarry pond in Kane county this afternoon.

Coordinates: 41.845538,-88.488436. This was 18 miles NW of the original location (Meijer in Oswego), and 15 miles N of the last observation (Dick's Sporting Goods in Yorkville). If anyone wants to chase this bird, please, please use caution. Do NOT enter the guarry. You can scope from the berm. If you see someone who works there it's best to give them a heads up prior to scoping.

There were also a dozen Mallards, 2 Hooded Mergansers, 40~ Cackling Geese, 400~ Canada Geese, and a flock of 68 Sandhill Cranes flew over.


