<u>Comments</u>: I am willing to accept a record of this species based on just hearing the distinctive single call note. It is distinctive. However, neither report describes the call, so we are left with the observers heard a single note call that they say sounded like a solitaire. The Gilbert submitted an audio recording and also included the same audio recording on an e-bird checklist that can be accessed. Unfortunately, I cannot hear the bird call on any of these recordings with my computer at full volume. On the e-bird submission, the recording has a sonogram. Looking at it, there is a sonogram signal of a single call. Unfortunately this signal does not look like the sonogram of Townsend's Solitaires that I have found on the internet, which has a strong pulse right at the start and then trail off on the same pitch. The note recorded by Gilbert seems to go down a little and really lacks a strong opening pulse. The pitch looks to be about right.
