6 PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

Looked liked 2 crosses as they soared directly above us. Only the undersides were visible. A long skinny straight neck, head and pointed, bill, corresponded with a very long tail. The tail was slightly fanned at the end. The wings were wide and the underwings were totally black, very wide where they joined the body. Both birds were solid black underneath, except for a thin pale terminal band on their tails. The yellow bill was long, thin and daggerlike.

7 DESCRIPTION OF BEHAVIOR

Soared directly overhead from the north, then soared southeast during the 2-3 minutes watching the birds from when first seen by the 3 observers, with both scopes and binoculars. One of the 2 birds descended and appeared to land somewhere along the E branch of the DuPage River, E and S of our hilltop vantage point. We lost track of the other bird at that time.

9 DESCRIPTION OF IMMEDIATE AND SURROUNDING HABITATS Top of a landfill hill 10 VIEWING CONDITIONS OPTICAL EQUIPMENT Swarovski scope w/20-60x eyepiece, Svarovski 8.5x42 binocs; 200-300 feet up when directly overhead. An easy binocular view for all 3 of us in very good viewing conditions with no sun glare and excellent contrast against the gray sky.

TIME(S) OF OBSERVATION. 11:30 AM CDT TOTAL TIME OF OBSERVATION Approx. 2-3 minutes

WEATHER/SKY CONDITIONS/RELATIVE POSITION OF SUN A moderate to strong NNE wind and overcast.

11 PREVIOUS EXPERIENCE WITH THIS AND SIMILAR SPECIES All 3 observers have seen this species on numerous occasions, both soaring and perched.

We've all seen D-c Cormorants on numerous occasions during the hawkwatch, both individual birds and in migrating flocks.

12 REASONS FOR ELIMINATING OTHER SIMILAR SPECIES OR HYBRID The main confusion bird would be an adult D-c Cormorant. The very long tail with an easily seen pale terminal band, dagger-like yellow bill, plus the effortless soaring behavior convinced us they were male Anhingas. 13 WERE PHOTOS OBTAINED? no
