13) Description of bird (size, shape, proportions, details of both color and pattern on head, back, chin, throat, breast, flanks, wings, undertail, and tail, etc.; coloration of soft parts: bill, legs, and feet) include only details actually seen in the field :	Brief but good look as bird flew by over parking lot. Obvious largish Dove with striking white wing flashes on inner wing contrasting with dark secondaries and primaries, body color was medium grey. White tips to the outer tail were also noted. I thought I noticed a small black mustachal stripe but due to distance and relative short viewing period as it was a fly-by sighting no additional plumage details were observed.
14) Description of behavior:	I saw the bird from a distance of perhaps 50 meters, first noticed as it flew behind a large tree - i waited for it to come out of the other side of the tree and immediately knew it was White-winged Dove as the white-wing flashes were the first obvious and noticeable ID feature. The bird showed no sign of stopping and continued flying west over Central Avenue and over the forest preserve. The bird flew approximately 30ft above the treetops.

23) Please eliminate other similar species and/or hybrids:	Mourning Dove would be the expected species in this area but the bird i saw did not have the long tapered tail and also showed the obvious white wing stripes. Eurasian Collared Dove could also be possible in the area but again this species lacks the white wing stripes.
